Background

Cashless Debit Card

The Cashless Debit Card (CDC) program supports communities in places where high levels of welfare dependence co-exist with high levels of social harm. The CDC trial is testing whether reducing the amount of cash available in a community will reduce the overall harm caused by welfare-fuelled alcohol, gambling or drug misuse.

The CDC began on 15 March 2016 in Ceduna, South Australia. Since then, it has expanded to the East Kimberley region, Western Australia on 26 April 2016, the Goldfields region, Western Australia on 26 March 2018 and the Bundaberg and Hervey Bay region, Queensland on 29 January 2019. The current legislative sunset date is 30 June 2020.

There are currently about 11,400 CDC participants across all CDC trial areas. CDC participants receive 20 per cent of their welfare payment in their nominated regular bank account and 80 per cent in their welfare-restricted bank account. The welfare-restricted funds cannot be used to buy alcohol or gambling products, some gifts cards or to withdraw cash.

In the Ceduna, Goldfields and East Kimberley regions, the CDC applies to all people who receive a working age welfare payment, with the exception of Age Pension and Veterans' Pension recipients. However, Age Pension and Veterans' Pension recipients, as well as people who earn money from other sources, such as paid work, may volunteer to participate. In the Bundaberg and Hervey Bay region, the CDC applies to people aged 35 and under who receive Newstart Allowance, Youth Allowance (Job seeker), Parenting Payment (Partnered) and Parenting Payment (Single). Unlike the other three sites, people in the Bundaberg and Hervey Bay region are not able to volunteer to participate in the program.



Cashless Debit Card - Goldfields Region

- The Cashless Debit Card Trial commenced in the Western Australia Goldfields Region in Kalgoorlie/Boulder, Coolgardie, Leonora, Laverton, Menzies and Kambalda on 26 March 2018.
- The trial was the first to have the Department of Social Services co-locate with the Department of Human Services at the Kalgoorlie Service Centre for the initial rollout.
- The trial was the largest of the rollouts so far with approximately 3000 customers from the Goldfields area transitioned to the Cashless Debit Card.
- Under the Cashless Debit Card trial, 80 per cent of a participant's welfare payment is placed on a Visa debit card that can be used at any merchant that accepts EFTPOS.
- The only time the Cashless Debit Card cannot be used is for the purchase of alcohol or gambling products or to withdraw cash.
- Recognising that participants will still need cash for minor expenses, such as children's lunch money, local farmer's markets or bus fares, the remaining 20 per cent of the welfare payment is deposited into the participant's regular account and can be withdrawn as cash.
- The Goldfields program applies to all people who receive a working age welfare payment, with the exception of Age Pension and Veterans Pension recipients.





How many people participated in the qualitative interviews?

- 178 stakeholders and 231 card participants were interviewed across all three sites.
- 78 per cent of Cashless Debit Card participant interviewees identified as being Indigenous, while around a third of interviewees were male (34 per cent) and two-thirds were female (66 per cent).
- More than half (58 per cent) of Cashless Debit Card participant interviewees received JobSeeker Payment (formerly Newstart Allowance), around 14 per cent received the Disability Support Pension, approximately 15 per cent received Parenting Payment (Partnered or Single), and the remainder were on other payments.





1 Executive summary

The Department of Social Services (the department) is responsible for the Cashless Debit Card (CDC), currently being trialled in Ceduna and surrounds, East Kimberley, Goldfields, and Bundaberg and Hervey Bay regions and surrounds.

As part of the 2019-20 Budget, the Australian Government announced the transition of IncomeManagement (IM) participants to the CDC in the Northern Territory (NT) and Cape York region and the extension of existing CDC sites for a further year to 30 June 2021. This included the transition of approximately 23,000 IM participants in the NT and Cape York to the CDC in 2020, commencing after legislation is passed.

The Social Security (Administration) Amendment (IM to CDC Transition) Bill 2019 (the Bill) was introduced to implement these measures. The Bill passed the House of Representatives on 27 November 2019 and has been introduced into the Senate. However, the Bill did not pass the Senate prior to the new arrangements for Parliament due to the COVID-19 pandemic.


The Government is committed to the passage of the Bill, as soon as possible in the next Parliamentary sitting period.

The department is responsible for the legislation, policy, engagement and other strategic elements of the CDC program. The department works closely with Services Australia, who is responsible for the IM to CDC transition of Northern Territory and Cape York participants, but the transition is dependent of the passage of legislation.


The department commenced engagement in the NT and Cape York on the IM to CDC transition in October 2019. As at 6 March, the department had conducted 83 community information sessions, visited over 70 communities, engaged with nearly 3,500 community members and met with 120 stakeholder and local organisations. A key finding from the engagement process is that participants are primarily concerned with how the transition will practically affect them.

The department commissioned Ernst & Young to articulate the differences between the two programs and to map the service offers between IM (BasicsCard) and the CDC in a way that could be used as a supporting communication tool. It is recommended this document be released to other Commonwealth agencies and relevant stakeholders in the NT and Cape York that participants are likely to contact for support and to clarify information about the proposed transition.








