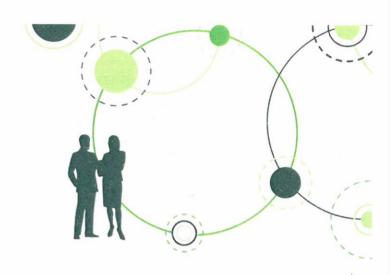

2. Task Academy





Once selected, young taskers will receive a two week training program that will make them ready for the task working world.

All taskers will receive support with general skills such as:

- IT
- Financial planning
- Time management
- Customer service
- Entrepreneurial skills

Sector specific training will also be provided from up to eight job sectors depending on participants' interests.

The positions crucial to the Task Academy include subject and skills trainers.

Task Academy training will focus on eight job sectors

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Insights from pilot participants' feedback on the Task Academy stage:

Week 1

General skills training focus

- ·IT
- · Financial planning
- · Time management
- · Customer service
- · Entrepreneuriai skills

Mix of face to face teaching, group work and videos online is preferred:

· One to one coaching is more comfortable for some skills like communication.

Relatable and knowledgeable staff

· 'Coach needs to speak at my level' and have a good knowledge of their area.

Week 2

- Sector specific training focus · The eight target job sectors make sense.
- · Certificates are important as employers ask for these when applying for jobs.
- · Young people would want information about where they can get higher certificates.
- · 'Videos are also helpful as you can go back to them and remind yourself.'

Happy to travel to training two to three days a week

Better if training is free

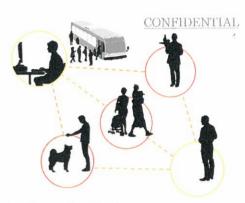
3. Task Apprenticeship



Once taskers are certificated in a particular job area, they will begin an apprenticeship.

The Y4Y Youth Force apprenticeship will last four weeks and will use trial tasks posted on existing platforms and with partner organisations. This will enable taskers to learn by doing while building their resilience and confidence on the job.

The positions crucial to the Task Apprenticeship include the Pilot Coordinator/Coach and the peer support 'Navigator'.



Insights from pilot participants' feedback on the Task Apprenticeship stage:

Week 1-2

Complete three tasks that are pre-organised:

 Receiving feedback and ratings from jobs is important.

No to self organised group transport:

 Prefer for the idea proponent to organise group transport especially where heavy equipment is required or it is a group task.

Like group work but control numbers to 2-3 per group:

- · More support.
- Could make transport easier.

Week 3

Complete three more tasks that are pre-organised:

 Participants like this aspect as it would give them confidence.

Applications for other small jobs allowed:

 If young people felt confident and they wanted to do more.

One to one check in with coach:

 This would help with general skills such as communication.

Week 4

Taskers have to complete at least two of their own self organised tasks:

- This makes the program mean something
- · '... you have to work for it'
- · '... you have to try.'

No 'learning journal' component:

- Rather than recording feedback and learning over time participants would prefer to receive immediate feedback
- 'It would be helpful to summarise your positive and negative after each job, like Uber.'
