



Intercountry Adoption Tracing and Reunification Service (ICATRS) Report

2017 – 2018 Financial Year

Introduction:

On 1/7/16 International Social Service (ISS) Australia received funding for one year from DSS to provide an Intercountry Adoption Tracing and Reunification Service (ICATRS). This service primarily provides information, support, and counselling to intercountry adoptees and adoptive parents in relation to their decision to trace birth family overseas and the tracing process. ISS Australia also uses the resources of the ISS international network and other contacts overseas to facilitate the tracing of birth family overseas and any information relevant to the adoptees identity.

ICATRS became fully operational on 1/9/16 after the new staff were recruited and trained. After the development and progress of the service's inaugural years funding, ISS Australia was provided with additional funding for 2017/18 Financial Year through the DSS FaRS funding stream.

Staffing:

ISS Australia's ICATRS staff have remained constant since the start of the service with the exception of one change s47F who was our full-time ICA Tracing Social Worker and highly valued team s47F. Her position was filled by 2 part-time social workers, s47F and s47F was fortunate to have a 2 week crossover with s47F allowing for a thorough induction and handover of s47F cases, including many introductory meetings with clients in order to limit the disruption of a change in social worker.

The stability of the ICATRS team has greatly assisted our clients as well as enhanced our ability to establish key working relationships with overseas colleagues and knowledge of specific countries post adoption procedures.

ICATRS Demand, Enquiries and Cases

The demand for ICATRS is clearly evident and has greatly exceeded the predicted 60 per annum case numbers. The new cases have been achieved with limited promotion of the service and this clearly indicates that one of the most prominent and conveyed needs for intercountry adoptees and their families is tracing and reunification services.

In ICATRS inaugural year (2016 / 2017) we opened 136 new cases, bearing in mind ICATRS only became fully operational on 1/9/16 when ICA Tracing Social Workers were employed. The demand of ICATRS has continued into our second year of funding, with another 103 new cases opened and allocated to the ICA Tracing Social Workers. This brought a total of 239 new cases received in a brief, less than 2 year period.

Review of ICATRS:

Many great outcomes have been achieved for our clients despite the brief period of operation. A Social Work Student conducted an in-depth Review of the ICA Tracing Service in early 2018 and the key survey results indicated that the majority of respondents were very satisfied to extremely satisfied with our service delivery (80%) and their social worker (95%). Client Feedback

ICATRS continues to receive positive reports from clients. Here are just 3 examples of the many we receive:

'ISS Australia has the knowledge, experience and contacts that an individual is unable to access. Also, an adoptee or adoptive parents is emotionally involved and therefore may rush to process if searching on their own, where a social worker is detached and would consider all parties involved.'

'Connecting our son with his biological family is really important to us. ISS Australia has made the impossible seem possible.'

'We are very thankful to ISS Australia for their guidance and support during the process of finding our child's birth mother. The social worker's advice on how to approach delivering information to our child, and how to communicate with other parties involved in the search was extremely helpful. Our goal was to find our child's birth mother and ISS Australia achieved this goal, handling all relationships along the way with respect and care.'

Conclusion:

ISS Australia is incredibly disappointed at a decision by the Department of Social Services (DSS) not to renew annual funding for the tracing and reunification service provided to Australian intercountry adoptees.

ICATRS was established in response to a significant level of need for assistance and support in the Australian intercountry adoptee community. Many Australian intercountry adoptees experience identity, grief and loss, attachment and trust issues which can manifest into serious problems including anxiety, self-harm, mental health concerns and even suicide. Many have a great desire and need to access information and reconnect with their biological family, country of origin, culture and language, this can be very difficult for individual adoptees and their families who have little or no knowledge how to navigate systems overseas and whom require professional support and counselling in both Australia and overseas.

The service has been very successful in its brief period of operation, establishing strong partnerships with overseas tracing partners, achieving many positive outcomes (including locating 55 biological families' overseas as well as facilitating 23 family reunions) and building up to its current level of over 238 clients. It has been enthusiastically embraced by Australian intercountry adoptees, their families and workers in the adoption field.

ISS Australia was therefore very shocked to learn that funding for ICATRS would not be renewed when the current funding agreement expires on 30 June 2018. Despite an appeal to the Minister and many articulate letters from support from adoption stakeholder and clients, it was extremely unfortunate that this decision to not renew our funded could not be renewed.

Whilst ISS Australia is appealing to alternative funding sources and philanthropy, we have been unable to secure the funds required to continue the service. The reality now is that the service has effectively been closed, the experienced staff have been made redundant, and our partnerships with overseas tracing services will likely end. More importantly ISS Australia feels regretful for the over 238 clients left without care and support from the workers they have come to know and trust.

Overall this really does seem an unfortunate outcome for a service that was launched less than two years ago with such strong hopes and acclaim from service beneficiaries and others in the adoption field around the world.
